C. A. Rotan [unidentified] lived in Hill County, Texas, in the years 1873 through 1875. In 1873 he rendered taxes on two horses, valued at \$100, and one poll. For 1874 he claimed one horse, valued at \$40, one mule worth \$40, and one poll. In 1875 he was taxed on 72 acres of land from the J. C. Lee survey, valued at \$250. In 1877 C. A. Rotton paid taxes on 82 acres of land valued at \$504, 1 wagon worth \$10, two horses worth \$100, 3 hogs valued at \$20, miscellaneous property of \$78, and one poll. **C. A. Roten** [sic] married **M. A. Sanders** on 15 November 1903 in Hill County, Texas. [C.A. C. H. Roten [unidentified] married **Jimmie L. Sweeney** on 23 August 1894 in Hill County, Texas. [Hill County, Texas Marriage Volume 6:488]

C. H. Rotan [unidentified] married **Sallie Pearson** on 21 March 1901 in Tyler County, Texas. [Tyler County, Texas Marriage Book 6:250]

Charles Rotan (about 1852 Alabama-unknown) was age 18 and lived in the household of a white farmer, **William H. Jones**, and his wife, **Mary**, on 22 March 1870. Several other people—white and black—lived in the household and appeared to be unrelated to the householder. The Jones family appeared to have come to Texas from Alabama after the Civil War. **Charles Rotan** may be the same man as **C. A. Rotan** above. [William H. Jones household, 1870 U. Chester County, South Carolina: In 1790, **John Roden, Jeremiah Roden, Thomas Roden, William Roden, and William, Ju Roden** lived in Chester County. Chester County, South Carolina: In 1800, **Greenberry Roden** (00100-00000-00 on page 83), **Jeremiah Roden** (21010-21010-00 on page 86), **John Roden** (22101-11200-05 on page 93), **Mary Roden** [widow of **William**] (22000-31010-00 on page 76), **Thomas Roden** (00101-00101-00 on page 84), **Thomas Roden** (01001-00101-00 on page 86), **Zadock Roden** (10101-11301-00 on page 84 and just above Thomas). *Conclusion: Jeremiah and one Thomas Roden remained in Chester County between the first and second federal censuses. William Roden had died and William Roden, Jr., had moved on. Mary Roden, the widow of William, was probably the mother of Greenberry Roden. Clarinda Rattan (about 1818 Madison County, Illinois-unknown) was a daughter of **Gillian Hill** (25 September 1792 Georgia-25 September 1870; buried Throckmorton Cemetery, Collin County, Texas) and **Thomas Rattan** (1787 South Carolina-11 November 1854; buried Throckmorton Cemetery, Collin County, Texas) and a granddaughter of **Mary Greene** (January 1755 Anson County, North Carolina-12 August 1827 Alton, Madison County, Illinois; buried Vaughn Cemetery on Wood River and Bethalto Road near Alton, Madison County, Illinois) and **John Rattan** (1747 North Carolina-11 October 1821 Madison County, Illinois; buried Vaughn Cemetery on Wood River and Bethalto Road near Alton, Madison County, Illinois). She first married **William Pyle** on 28 October 1835 in Greene County, Illinois. Secondly, she married **William McKindree Moore** on 06 May 1852 in St. Clair County, Illinois. This man named William McKindree Moore was an uncle of the man by the same name who married Clarinda's niece, **George Ann Rattan**. [Thomas Rattan tombstone; Gillian Hill Rattan tombstone; E. E.
