



John Martin Cauble

John Martin Cauble was born in Tennessee on 03 September 1812 to unidentified parents. He may have been a nephew or a cousin of Peter Cauble, Sr. John M. Cauble's mother may have been Anne Cauble/Cobble, who was recorded in the house next to John's family in Lincoln County, Tennessee, on the 1840 U. S. census. John M. Cauble had a close tie to Peter Cauble and settled in Tyler County, Texas, after Peter and his family arrived there. He moved on to McLennan County, Texas, by 1856, where other children of Peter Cauble lived.

At sometime between 1832 and 1835, he married probably in Lincoln County, Tennessee, the daughter of James Frost, the mother of his daughters, Samantha A. Cauble (about 1836 Tennessee-unknown) and Sarah Cauble (about 1838 Tennessee-after 07 July 1870), according to the will of James Frost.

After Martin's military service, he apparently settled in Tyler County, Texas, near the Peter Cauble family. In 1847 he paid a poll in that county and on 12 February 1847 he remarried in that county. He married **Mariah Jane Rotan**, daughter of John A. Rotan and a kinsman of Mary Ann Rotan. He continued to pay a poll and a tax on horses through 1850. On 13 November 1850, the Martin Cauble family still lived in Tyler County. Martin was listed as a 37-year-old farmer with \$100 in property; he was born in Tennessee. Mariah Jane was twenty and born in Alabama. His Tennessee-born daughters were Samantha A., 14, and Sarah, 12.

Some time between 1861 and 1865, John Martin Cauble served in the Civil War. His grave was set with a Confederate States of America marker. No record of his service is among the Civil War records at the Texas State Library.

On 28 May 1879, Martin Cauble died probably in Hill County and was buried in Bold Springs Cemetery, West, McLennan County, Texas. He was buried in a plot where his sister-in-law, Mary Ann Rotan King, and brother-in-law, Peter Johnson King, were later buried. On 03 June 1880, the widowed Jane Cauble, age 46 and born in Alabama, with both parents born in Tennessee, was listed on the census in Hill County, Texas.



J1 Samantha A. Cauble (1836 Tennessee-unknown), a daughter of her father's first marriage, was already past sixteen and perhaps married by 1854 when the Texas school census was taken in Tyler County, Texas, where her father lived. She was listed on the 1850 federal census. [John M. Cauble household, 1850 U. J2 Sarah Cauble (1838 Tennessee-after 07 July 1870) was a daughter of her father's first marriage. She was listed as student age on the 1854 Tyler County entry on Texas Scholastics as was George Rotan, who also lived in the household of Mariah Jane Rotan and John M. Cauble. Apparently, Sarah moved to McLennan County, Texas, with her father and stepmother. Sarah Cauble married **Dudly Baily** (about 1831 Tennessee-unknown), probably the son of a neighbor, on 05 February 1857 in McLennan County, Texas, with W. S. Grimes, a Baptist preacher, officiating. By 07 July 1860 they lived on a McLennan County farm, near Bold Springs, with two young daughters.
