## Content of record:

Amos Lacy late of the County of White [,] Yeoman[,] was led to the bar in custody of the sheriff of White and thereupon arraigned — and upon his arraignment pleads not guilty, and for his trial puts himself upon the county and thereupon came a jury of good and lawful men to wit: Isham Bradley, John Waller, Joel Bradshaw, William Clary, Elijah Ward, Robert Glenn, James Moore, **Jabez Fitzgerald**, Ericus Smith, Solomon Burford, Jacob Scallion, John Scoggins, who being elected tried and sworn the truth of and upon the premises to speak and having heard the evidence on their oaths do say that the said Amos is guilty in manner and form as charged in the Bill of Indictment it is therefore the opinion of the Court that the defendant be fined twelve and one half cents & the costs Judgment accordingly.

**Comment:** Yeoman here refers to a free man who is qualified to serve on juries and to vote, rather than the United States Navy appointive petty officer who performs clerical duties. — Black's Law Dictionary, Fifth Edition (1979), 1449
