The Board Meeting



The Board of Directors—shown above facing camera, President James Cauble E7223, Chaplain Kiefer Cauble H2361, Vice President Dan Chick H23531, Editor Julia Cauble Smith H2353, Treasurer Gwen Chick MH23531, Chaplain Don Cauble E1.12.6, Director Brad Christmas D6.10.32 [back to camera], and Secretary Connie Baker Wallner E22221—met to discuss finances, cemetery maintenance, the scholarship fund, and the auction.

Past President **Dan Cauble** H1321 was present at the meeting after the photo was taken. Director **Bill Cauble** E7221 was supervising the food preparation. Past Presidents—**Roy Hughes** C14232, **James Carroll Cauble** E1432, and **Jane Levý** E1361, Scrapbook Chairman **Revis Cauble Leonard** H23611, and Webmaster **Sylvia Caldwell Rankin** C76211 were unable to attend.

At the meeting, the Board gave the treasurer independent authority to manage the money accounts to earn more interest. Since the treasurer is a Certified Public Accountant and the former Chief Financial Officer of Texas Bank, she is well qualified to professionally handle the organization's money.

Members of the Board voted to send \$500 to help maintain the Historic Peter Cauble House and the Cauble-Burch Cemetery at Peach Tree Village in Tyler County. Two other ancestral cemeteries requested money to help with summer mowing—Prairie Grove Cemetery in McLennan County, Texas, and Roby Cemetery in Fisher County, Texas. The Board approved a gift of \$50 to each.

All proceeds from the 2007 auction were designated for the scholarship fund. The auction brought in about \$1700. The Brad Christmas family graciously provides a matching grant for the scholarship fund in the same amount as the auction.

The suggestion was made at the board meeting that Texas Cauble Family Association look toward the possible creation of an endowment for the scholarship fund. This idea was received enthusiastically by all board members, but no plans are ready to present at this date.



From the C7 Family Registry

Ethel Irena Wood C76 (06 January 1878 Hood County, Texas-16 June 1950 Lovington, Lea County, New Mexico), a daughter of **Jessie Loucinda Cauble** (1 April 1853 Hill County, Texas-8 October 1923) and **George Washington Wood** (25 December 1846 Hall County, Georgia-28 February 1934 Potter County, Texas), was age 2 and lived with her parents and siblings in Hood County, Texas, in the summer of 1880. That was the first time her name appeared in public records.

When she was eighteen, Ethel Irene Wood married **Andrew Franklin Caldwell** (17 May 1864 Rome, Floyd County, Georgia-08 February 1947 Lovington, New Mexico), son of **Frances Ann Bailey** (13 March 1841 Cherokee County, Georgia-28 September 1869 Talking Rock, Pickens County, Georgia) and **Allison Caldwell** (28 July 1838 Talking Rock, Pickens County, Georgia-08 September 1901 Fall Creek, Hood County, Texas), on 20 October 1896 in Cleburne, Johnson County, Texas. After their marriage, the couple migrated from Texas to Oklahoma Territory, where they had filed on a homestead located on Wildhorse Creek, northeast of Hammon in the present Roger Mills or Custer County, Oklahoma.

Franklin Caldwell's family initially lived in a dugout, as many early settlers did. On 15 April 1910 when the census taker came to the Caldwell home, the couple and their children lived on their farm at Dewey, Roger Mills County, Oklahoma. Over the years, the Caldwells had six children—Katie (1897), Lorenzo Dow (1899), Alfred Bartow (1902), Allen Frank (1903), Jessie Lu (1905), and Dorothy (1907). Ethel and Frank Caldwell migrated to New Mexico in the early 1900s. It was here that Ethel raised her grandson, Tearle Kring. She died at the home of her daughter, Jessie Lu Caldwell Osburn, in Lovington, New Mexico. Ethel and Frank Caldwell are both buried in the Lovington Cemetery. From the D6 Family Registry

Mary Ann Burch D6 (before 22 June 1853-22 February 1918), a daughter of Helen Elmira Cauble (15 August 1819 Franklin County, Alabama-3 April 1889 Tyler County, Texas) and Valentine Ignatius Burch (14 February 1813 Bullit County, Kentucky-17 October 1892 Polk County, Texas), was born in Trinity County, Texas. On 22 June 1870 she was recorded as age seventeen, born in Texas, and living with her parents at their Tyler County farm. Mary Ann Burch married Stephen Lafayette Lewis (20 April 1851 Mississippi-27 April 1924) on 5 January 1874 in Tyler County, Texas.

The couple had eleven children—James Lafayette (1874), Angus Valentine (1875), Robert Lee (1877), Henry Shepard [Hal] (1879), Mary Emma (1880), John Ignatius (1883), Alice Helen (1885), Stella Gertrude (1887), Joseph Murrell (1888), Leo Burch Lewis (1891), and Loyola Chase (1894). Lafayette Lewis was a farmer and stockman. The family was Roman Catholic. [Documentation will be sent to any who requests it from the Editor.]

In Her Own Words

"Only within the last few years I learned from my sister Emma that my grandmother [Helen Elmira Cauble Burch], who was truly a Cauble in every sense of the word, was so annoyed and disappointed with my mother for not marrying Dr. Whitehead to whom she had been engaged, that she refused to let my mother marry in the home. In order to prevent an elopement, my grandfather took a firm stand—even against a Cauble—and arranged for the marriage to be performed on the grounds. Father Hennessey, a young priest who was assigned to the Peach Tree Village mission, performed the ceremony. This was the first marriage that Father had blessed, but it seemed to have had a lasting impression

"When I was a very young girl at Ursuline Academy in Dallas, Father Hennessey was there for some celebration. I made it my business to meet him and I made known to him, very proudly, that he had married my mother and father—Mary Ann Burch and Lafayette Lewis of Peach Tree Village. I had already gotten Father Hennessey's blessing, but when I finished my little speech, he had me kneel to receive another blessing.

"My grandfather was always devoted to my father. When Mama first met Papa, he was working for Grandfather. He was a poor orphan boy, not a Catholic, but these factors in no way affected either Mother or Grandfather...I was eight or nine when Papa embraced the Faith, and what a devoted Catholic he proved to be. It was my privilege to nurse him in his last illness at St. Joseph's in Fort Worth. He was conscious within an hour of his death, and so often spoke of the great gift of Faith. Mama had died five years previously in the home of my older brother, Angus. I also had the privilege of nursing her in her last illness. This was hard for all of us, but especially for dear Papa, who loved her so deeply."
