S. W. Fitzgerald (1815 Tennessee-unknown) and **M. Fitzgerald** (about 1821 Alabama-unknown) were listed with their household in Fannin County, Texas, on 31 January 1851. Living in their household were **Jos. P. Fitzgerald**, a 10 year-old male and born Texas; **A. H. Fitzgerald**, a 7-year-old male born Texas; **J. B. Fitzgerald**, 1-year-old male born Texas, four men apparently boarded with the family; and six black and mulatto slaves lived in the household. Any relationship between this family and that of Elizabeth Rotan Fitzgerald is unknown. [S. W. Fitzgerald household, 1850 U. Sarah Ann Rattan (maybe 1825 Greene County, Illinois-unknown) was a daughter of **Gillian Hill** (25 September 1792 Georgia-1870; buried Throckmorton Cemetery, Collin County, Texas) and **Thomas Rattan** (1787 South Carolina-11 November 1854; buried Throckmorton Cemetery, Collin County, Texas) and a granddaughter of **Mary Greene** (January 1755 Anson County, North Carolina-12 August 1827 Alton, Madison County, Illinois; buried Vaughn Cemetery on Wood River and Bethalto Road near Alton, Madison County, Illinois) and **John Rattan** (1747 North Carolina-11 October 1821 Madison County, Illinois; buried Vaughn Cemetery on Wood River and Bethalto Road near Alton, Madison County, Illinois). She married **Hiram J. McKinney**, who may have been called **Carrol McKinney**, on 16 September 1847 in Collin County, Texas. Sarah A. Rotan (1848 Texas-unknown), a daughter of **Zemilia [or Zimila] Ann Askew** (26 September 1828 Mississippi-19 June 1915 Hopkins County, Texas; buried Union Springs Cemetery, Hopkins County, Texas) and **John Willis Rotan** (1826 Alabama-19 December 1858 Polk County, Texas), was a granddaughter of **John A. Rotan** (1794 South Carolina-by October 1858 Tyler County, Texas). She lived with her parents in Tyler County, Texas, on 14 November 1850. On 11 August 1860 she lived with widowed mother and siblings in Polk County, Texas. Sarah Rotan was age 20 and lived with her mother and siblings when the family was recorded twice on the 1870 U. S. census. On 07 May 1876 she married **R. D. Miller** in Hopkins County, Texas. [John W. Rotan household, 1850 U. Sarah Rattan (about 1794 Kentucky or South Carolina-unknown), perhaps a daughter of **Mary Greene** (January 1755 Anson County, North Carolina-12 August 1827 Alton, Madison County, Illinois; buried Vaughn Cemetery on Wood River and Bethalto Road near Alton, Madison County, Illinois) and **John Rattan** (1747 North Carolina-11 October 1821 Madison County, Illinois; buried Vaughn Cemetery on Wood River and Bethalto Road near Alton, Madison County, Illinois), married **William Montgomery** on 13 December 1814 in Madison County, Illinois. Sarah Rotan (about 1796 South Carolina-between 29 May 1843 and 25 May 1846 Fannin County, Texas), a daughter of **William Rotan/Rhotan** (about 1762-by 05 July 1841 White County, Tennessee), was a widow when she was named as an heir in the distribution of her father's estate on 18 April 1845 in White County, Tennessee. She was the widow of **James T. Garnett** (1780-by 01 December 1840 Fannin County, Texas, when his probate came to court), whom she married in White County, Tennessee. In 1830 the family of James Garnett lived in the same neighborhood in Marion County, Alabama, as the families of **John Rotan**, **Jabez Fitzgerald**, and **Garrett Fitzgerald**. At that time the **James Garnett** family consisted of one male under age 5, one male age 10-15, one male age 15-20, one male age 40-50, two females age 5-10, two females age 10-15, one female age 20-30, and one female age 30-40. Among their eight possible children (three sons and five daughters) who were listed on the 1830 U. S. census, their children may be identified as **John R. Garnett**, who administered his father's estate and who married his first cousin, **Margaret Fitzgerald Baker** on 09 May 1843; **William Garnett** who married his first cousin, **Sarah Fitzgerald Sadler** on 03 July 1856, **James T. Garnett, Jr.** (1825 Alabama-after 1851); and **Robert Garnett** (1832 Kentucky-after 06 August 1870). [James Garnett(sic) household, 1830 U. By 1840 J. T. Garnett and family were living in Fannin County, Texas. He paid a poll and taxes on two slaves. His sons, **J. R. Garnett** and **William Garnett**, each paid a poll in the county. [Fannin County, Texas Assessment Rolls for 1840]

Susan Jane Rotan (about 1832 White County, Tennessee-1854), a daughter of **Cynthia Jones** (1812 White County, Tennessee-after 1884 Illinois) and **John Minor Rotan** (about 1807-by May 1837 White County, Tennessee), and granddaughter of **William Rotan** (about 1760 South Carolina-by 05 July 1841 White County, Tennessee), lived only into early adulthood. Susan Jane Rotan (about 1798 South Carolina or Kentucky-28 December 1838 Arkansas), a daughter of **Rosann/Rosey** ___ (1770s-before 1820 White County, Tennessee) and **William Rotan/Rhotan** (about 1762-by 05 July 1841 White County, Tennessee), married Dr. **William Edward Throckmorton** (01 October 1796 Virginia-02 October 1843; buried Throckmorton Cemetery, Collin County, Texas), a physician in Sparta, Tennessee, on 10 December 1818 probably in White County, Tennessee, and had six children. By May 1836 William E. Throckmorton migrated with his family to Washington County, Arkansas. The children of Susan Rotan Throckmorton were named as heirs of her father's estate on 18 April 1845 in White County, Tennessee. Susan Rotan Throckmorton was already deceased by that date. They were **William Albion Little Throckmorton** (20 September 1819 Sparta, White County, Tennessee-1856 Benton, Arkansas) who married **Mary Eliza Fletcher** in March 1840; **Mary Lee Throckmorton** (14 December 1821 White County, Tennessee-20 January 1822 White County, Tennessee); Dr. **John Augustus Throckmorton** (07 January 1823 Sparta, White County, Tennessee-unknown) who first married **Nancy Garnett** on 01 November 1842 and secondly **Martha Hill Tucker** on 28 December 1872; **James Webb Throckmorton** (01 February 1825 Sparta, White County, Tennessee-21 April 1894; buried Stoney Point Cemetery, Collin County, Texas), who married **Anne Rattan** (25 March 1829-31 October 1895; buried Stoney Point Cemetery, Collin County, Texas) in February 1848 and later became governor of Texas; **Robert Middleton Throckmorton** (29 January 1828-1863 Battle of Mansfield, Louisiana) who married **Eva Fish**; **Lucy Jane Throckmorton** (23 March 1831 White County, Tennessee-25 May 1832 White County, Tennessee); and **Nancy Hampton Throckmorton** (03 April 1836 Fayetteville, Washington County, Arkansas-1878) who married **James Meredith Wilcox** in June 1856. Reportedly, Dr. Throckmorton remained in Arkansas for a time after Susan Jane Rotan Throckmorton died, then he took his family to Illinois for a short time and then he moved back to Arkansas. On 24 January 1841 Dr. Throckmorton married **Malinda Clements**. Later in 1841, Dr. Throckmorton and his family settled on a small watercourse that became known as Throckmorton Creek, located northeast of McKinney, near Melissa, Texas, in Collin County. Their neighbors were **William R. Garnett**, **Garrett Fitzgerald**, **Littleton Rattan**, **Pleasant Wilson**, **Edmund Dodd**, **Benjamin White**, **William Pulliam**, and **John Kincaid**. Malinda Clements and William E. Throckmorton had two children, **Virginia Throckmorton** (24 November 1841 Texas-about 1875) and **Edward Throckmorton** (13 May 1843 Texas-25 December 1862 during the Civil War on the Red River). **Malinda Clements Throckmorton** married **John H. Wilson** on 28 October 1845 in Fannin County, Texas. Sarah Fitzgerald (unknown-unknown) was a daughter of **Elizabeth Rotan** (1784 South Carolina-October or November 1845 Fannin County, Texas) and **Jabez Fitzgerald** (before 1786 Tennessee-before 27 November 1843 Fannin County, Texas, when his probate came to court) and a granddaughter of **William Rotan/Rhotan** (about 1762-by 05 July 1841 White County, Tennessee). She first married **William Sadler**, who was named in the probate proceedings of her father's estate. Secondly, **Sarah Sadler** married **William Garnett** on 03 July 1856 in Fannin County, Texas.
